# **Council Encampment Basics**

#### What to bring

Standard weekend camping equipment is required for those units who are camping on site; Tents, cook stoves, cookware, dining fly, tables, etc. There are no tables or chairs on your campsite, only a patch of grass, so bring everything you need for your campsite. Space will be tight, so only bring what you need for an overnight campout.

**Food is not provided**, so please bring food for your unit's meals **Open campfires are not allowed**, so please bring cook stoves for food preparation.

# Specific Gear Needed:

#### **All Participants Bring From Home:**

- Camp Chairs for the evening show
- "Tribal Buffs", or colorful bandannas for the Scouts to wear during the event. These are to be
  made by the Scouts at home, with colors and patterns decided on by each Patrol, Troop Den or
  Pack.
- Tiki Torches for the Evening Show. One per Patrol or Den
- Basic Personal Camping Gear: sleeping bag, raingear, first aid kit, change of clothes, etc. See your Scout Handbook for details.

# Special Gear Requirements for the Camporee Technical Challenge Area:

#### **Boy Scout Camporee Participants Competition Gear Needed:**

- 10 Essentials for all Boy Scouts participating in the Camporee
- Special Equipment for the Cooking Challenges:
  - Portable stove
  - 8" or larger Cooking pot
  - Serving Spoon
- A GPS receiver, Smartphone or other device (see below) to be used in the Technology Challenge
- A Map of the Frontier Park area
- A compass (part of your 10 essentials)
- An understanding of land navigation basics, the latitude & longitude system and how to use a GPS.

Ensure your patrol is familiar with the various formats that latitude/longitude can be expressed in and be sure they bring WHATEVER technology the patrol might find helpful navigating to various places to hunt for an idol.

Patrols can use map/compass, GPS, cell phones, computers, cameras, etc. to accomplish this task. All the locations the patrol needs to find will be either a latitude/longitude coordinate or compass bearing/distance.

#### Special Needs - CPAP

If you need to use a CPAP machine that requires power, there are a limited number of electrical outlets in the camping area. Campsites have already been assigned for adults with CPAP machines.

#### Food Plan

Scout units who camp over the weekend are responsible for bringing and preparing their own meals. Saturday's lunch break is only 1 hour, so plan on a 'quick-to-fix' meal that does not involve cooking or washing dishes. Some food vendors will be available to purchase fast food, however do not rely on them to feed your unit. **Food is not included in the price of admission.** 

FOOD ALLERGY NOTE: Some Boy Scout Camporee stations involve eating food, so if you have a food allergy, take that into consideration when choosing which patrol members are selected to 'eat' the food in the challenge.

# Campsite Plan

#### **Troop Camping**

Troops will camp in the front field of the park, Jamboree style. A standard Scout unit campsite for 30 people is approximately 30' x 50', however smaller units will be assigned smaller spaces with other smaller units, according to their headcount.

A 30' x 50' campsite holds approximately 8 or 9 three-man tents and two pop up canopies, with a 10' pathway in the center. Scoutmasters are responsible to see that the tents their units bring will accommodate all of their Scouts, and can be adequately situated within the campsite footprint, without encroaching on the neighboring Unit's site. See the diagram in Appendix B for details.

Troop Campsite assignments will be found in Appendix B.

# **Cub Scout Family Camping**

Cub Scout families will camp in the play area on the South East corner of the park. Cub Camping will be first come, first served.

#### Staff Camping

Staff camping is located to the west of the Scouting Festival area, along the road between the camporee grounds and the parking lot. Event staff should plan to arrive early, to allow time for setup of their activity areas prior to 3:00 PM Friday.

#### Carpooling and Equipment Loading

Due to the limited availability of parking space, <u>units are strongly encouraged to carpool</u>, to reduce the number of vehicles on site. Upon arrival at the park, please park your cars in the lot, and consolidate your camping gear into one vehicle to unload at the campsite parking area.

One vehicle per unit will be allowed in the camping parking area to unload gear.

#### Wastewater & Garbage Disposal Procedure

Wastewater tanks for gray water and Grease Barrels for cooking grease will be provided at the troop campsite area. Please bring adequate buckets and washbasins to do your unit's dishes at your campsite, and haul the gray water to the dump tanks. Do not dump wastewater on the ground.

Kitchen grease barrels will be provided for cooking grease disposal. Grease should be transported to the barrels in a container to avoid spillage between the campsite and the barrels.

Dumpsters will be provided for garbage disposal on site. Please bring garbage bags for use at your campsite, and make sure to dump them on Saturday night before you go to bed.

# **Event Overview - FAQ's**

#### **Event Overview:**

The intent of this event is to be a recurring 'Council-Wide' event, held every four years, and similar in design to WashJam, only with a smaller participant base, and the inclusion of a themed Camporee element. The overall Event Theme would include the following program elements: Scout Festival, Cub World, Council Encampment, Council-wide Camporee, night time adventure activity.

#### **Long Range Council Event Plan**

- 2012 WashJam (Cubs, Scouts, Varsity, Venturing)
- 2013 National Jamboree
- 2014 Council Camporee/Scouting Festival (Cubs, Boy Scouts, Varsity, Venturing)
- 2015 District Camporees only, no major Council level activities planned
- 2016 WashJam (Cubs, Boy Scouts, Varsity, Venturing)
- 2017 National Jamboree
- 2018 Council Camporee/Scouting Festival (Cubs, Boy Scouts, Varsity, Venturing)

#### Q: What is this event all about?

**A:** It is five Scouting events in one:

- Council-wide Camporee, loosely based upon the Survivor TV show
- Scouting Festival, similar to the "Scout-O-Rama" concept
- Cub Scout Adventure World
- Adult Leader Training Seminars
- Council-Wide Encampment (3-day campout)

#### Q: Where and when will it be held?

A: Frontier Park, Graham, WA, September 19 - 21, 2014

#### Q: Who can participate?

A: Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, Varsity Teams, Venturers, Adults

#### Q: What will we do there?

**A:** There is something for everyone at Survivor: Pacific Harbors:

- **Cub Scouts:** Cub Adventure World & Scouting Festival
- Boy Scouts: Survivor Camporee & Scouting Festival
- Varsity, Venturing: Camp Staff, Scouting Festival, other volunteer opportunities
- Adult Leaders: Camp Staff, Leader-Specific Training
- Everyone: Scouting Festival, Cub Scout Adventure World

#### Q: What kinds of activities will there be at the Survivor Camporee?

A: There are three major areas at this event:

#### Survivor: Pacific Harbors Camporee

The **Boy Scout Survivor Camporee competition** will be segmented into five different themed areas, with 25 event stations. Patrols will receive a schedule of competition activity stations, with 20 minute rotations. Each station is designed to take 10 minutes to complete, with 5 minutes of briefing time, and 5 minutes of travel time.

#### Patrol Size Restrictions:

Due to the large number of activities going on, and the structured nature of the competition events, we must impose a minimum and maximum number of boys per Boy Scout patrol participating in the Camporee. **Minimum patrol size is 5 boys, maximum patrol size is 8 boys.** 

Troops with less than 5 boys or individual Scouts who come alone will be paired up with other smaller units, to form patrols of 8 boys each. Should a 'mixed' patrol win one of the top three places in the camporee, all individual units from these patrols will take home a winner's ribbon.

# **Evening Challenge Showdown**

The Camporee will culminate in an Evening Show with elimination challenges for the top 10 scoring patrols to determine the overall winner. The elimination will take place in 5 rounds:

- **First round 10 Patrols** do a Technical Challenge (using just 3 scouts from each patrol). The patrols must light their torches using some unusual method with the first eight patrols completing the challenge getting to advance to the second challenge.
- Second round 8 Patrols do a Food Challenge (using only 2 scouts from each patrol).
   Top five patrols advance to the third challenge.
- Third round 5 Patrols do a Physical Challenge (using only 3 scouts from each patrol). Top three patrols advance to the fourth challenge.
- **Fourth round 3 Patrols** do a Leadership Challenge (using 5 scouts from each patrol). Top two patrols advance to the final challenge.
- **Fifth and Final Challenge 2 Patrols** do a Mental Challenge (using equal or all members of each patrol). Top patrol wins the camporee.

# **Immunity Idols**

The patrols will be able to earn a limited number of Immunity Idols during the course of the camporee, depending upon whether they solve various mystery aspects in each of the camporee themed areas. Awarding of these idols is up to each of the five Area Directors. The Idols will be used to avoid elimination in the final Evening Challenge Showdown. Each patrol in the final rounds may use one Idol one time.

#### Mystery Night Time Adventure

There will also be a mystery night time adventure activity after the show, starting at approximately 9:00 PM.

- Scout Store Trading Post
- Food vendors
- Scout Unit Fund Raising booths

#### **Adult Leader Training**

The **Adult Leader Training** sessions will feature the following classes:

- Cub Scout Den Leader training (Tiger/Wolf/Bear) 9:00 AM Noon
- Cub Scout Den Leader training (Webelos) 9:00 AM Noon
- Boy Scout Leader Specific training 9:00 AM 4:30 PM

Sign up for training classes on Friday night, at the Leader's meeting. All-day training classes will be located in the rear of the Fairgrounds office building. Cub Scout den Leader training classes will be held in the "Dog Building".

#### FAQ's

#### Q: How much does it cost, and when can I register?

**A:** The event fees are set up to encourage early registration and to get a commitment from Scout units early in the year. Registration opened on January 10, 2014. The participant fee structure is as follows:

Early Bird Participant Pricing of \$25 per person ended on March 31, 2014.

Subsequent price levels are as follows:

\$30 per person if paid by June 30, 2014

#### \$35 per person if paid by September 18, 2014

\$40 per person if paid onsite, on September 19, 2014

Event Staff Fees are \$20 per person, which includes a Staff T-Shirt, staff patch and all meals.

#### Q: Is there a limit to the number of participants?

A: Yes, when approximately 2000 combined participants have registered for the Camporee & Cub

Adventure World programs, registration for these areas will be closed, and a waiting list established. The Camporee will have the capacity to handle 120 Boy Scout Patrols, with 30 activity stations.

#### Q: Who has signed up already?

**A:** Over 1050 participants from 22 Cub Scout Packs and 58 Boy Scout Troops have registered as of September 15, 2014. The current listing of registered Scout units is **here**.

#### Q: How often will this event be held?

A: This event occurs every four years, two years after WashJam, the State Scout Jamboree:

- 2012 WashJam
- 2014 Survivor: Pacific Harbors
- 2016 WashJam
- 2018 Council Camporee, theme TBD

#### Q: Do you need volunteers to help staff the event?



# Frontier Park






Scouting Festival and Cub Scout Adventure World:



# **Appendix B: Council Encampment Camping Layout**

The Council Encampment area is laid out "Jamboree Style", meaning troops are situated next to each other on a grid pattern, in an open field. Larger units will be assigned a 55' x 30' campsite, as shown below. Smaller units with 15 people or less (including leaders) will share a larger site with another unit.



# **Troop Campsite Assignments**

The following campsite assignments are made based upon the size of your unit, and the available campsite space. Smaller units are expected to share a larger site with other smaller units. Units who are sharing a campsite are expected to 'make new friends' as opposed to asking to be moved to a different campsite, so requests for re-assignments will be politely declined.



# Standard Troop Site for 27 People:


Tents shown below are 10'x 10' square. More smaller tents may be accommodated in the same space if needed or larger tents may be used, however campsite loading is based upon 3 people sharing a 10'x10' tent.



Follow 176th Street to Meridian South

Turn right on Meridian, and follow it to Frontier Park, at 116th Street.

Enter the event through the dirt road on the north side of the park.
